Exchange prevents democracy

Last week's Strategy Note 308 said wealthy people organize to prevent democracy.

They usually use indirect methods such as campaign contributions. When they feel in serious danger, they will use more direct methods to impose their desires.

Within the wealthy fraction of an exchange economy, a conflict often exists between those who prefer to rule by indirect methods and those who prefer to rule directly.

In the United States, the Democratic Party generally serves the wealthy who prefer indirect methods while the Trumpists have captured the Republican Party for the wealthy who prefer direct methods. Neither indirect rule by the wealthy nor direct rule by the wealthy will create a society good for working people.

Serious differences exist between the societies likely to result from governments dominated by those two parties. However, neither party shows any likeliness to create a democratic society controlled by working people.

Any economy that includes exchange will tend to create increasing inequality of wealth, to concentrate political authority, to exclude poor people and working people from political influence, and to weaken the organizations of working people (such as unions).

To achieve a world good for working people, we must eliminate exchange.

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
